DREF - Anticipated Unmet Needs

The State of Missouri received more than 230 applications for funding in excess of \$250,000,000 for our PL-110-329 appropriation. This is nearly two and one half times the state's awarded grant amount. To date we have awarded 55,230,947 that are detailed in DRGR, with another \$25,071,500 committed and in process of executed grants. There are applications currently in our review and development process that will exceed the remaining Supplemental Appropriation and will be awarded based on competitive scoring.

Missouri is proposing to dedicate \$5M of funding to access a dollar for dollar match of \$5M more in DREF funds. The funds will be offered using a request for proposals or notice of fund availability method of distribution. Applicants will be evaluated on need, impact, and local effort. The State of Missouri has a significant amount of land mass residing in the 100 year and 500 year floodplain, as defined by the Federal Emergency Management Agency FIRM maps. Historically, the state developed using the river network (Missouri River and Mississippi River and their tributaries) as a transportation network to ship goods to the west. As such, communities developed and grew along those rivers and tributaries. That growth has contributed to flooding events that impact the health, safety and well-being of Missourian's. Loss of life and loss of homes, businesses, personal property and the devastation to real property has burdened the state during significant, widespread flooding events. Between 1990 and 2009, Missouri recorded more than 90 deaths due to flash and riverine flooding. Proof of that widespread damaging capacity came in the form of a Presidential disaster declaration for 106 of the 114 total counties in the State in 2008. Missouri is home to 977 cities, towns and villages in those 114 counties.

Since the floods of 1993, Missouri has created and implemented an aggressive buyout of properties in the floodplain and we have realized substantial savings as a result. More than 1000 properties have been purchased and deed restricted in perpetuity to open space activities in the last decade and one half. Those properties will never again receive a National Flood Insurance Program payment. They will never subject a resident to danger or experience damage to a structure. The program can be called a success. However, FEMA estimates that more than 216,000 households are within designated floodplains in Missouri. To date, in the short period between the notice of available DREF funding, we have identified 5 more communities that are prepared to support more buyout activities. There are more eligible properties, more willing communities, and more families deserving of a decent, safe and sanitary comparable home, outside of the floodplain. Many of these communities will use CDBG funds to match FEMA Hazard Mitigation funding but there are additional, smaller river communities that are not eligible for FEMA funds, that our efforts could support, as well.

Even with the buyout activities, Missouri's communities will always be linked to the rivers. Their future, their viability and in many cases their economic activity is still linked to the waterways. It isoson, that access to fundingland use plte resourcev

ouri for planning activities. We have regional planning commissions, councils of government, and federally designated economic development districts. Those service providers assist with economic development strategic planning, redevelopment planning and planning related to specific projects. There is however, a gap in a community's access to real land use planning.

Some mitigation efforts in Missouri have been driven by need as a response to an event. Land use planning will give many communities an opportunity to address that next step of development or redevelopment through a systematic analysis of land assets that derives efficient uses of land. A forward thinking land use plan will include views of the many facets of land use and the many impacts including the environment, society, and the local economy.

Areas of Greatest Need

The Consolidated Security, Disaster Assistance, and Continuing Appropriations Act (PL-110-329 and hereafter identified as the Second 2008 Act) appropriates over \$6 billion in CDBG funds for necessary expenses related to disaster relief, long-term recovery, and restoration of infrastructure, housing and economic revitalization in areas affected by hurricanes, flooding and other natural disasters that occurred during 2008. The allocation awarded to Missouri from this Supplemental Appropriation is \$92,605,490. There were six separate Presidentially-declared Disasters in Missouri during 2008. At least 3,892 homes were affected by weather related events in 2008, with 1,839 being affected, 1,488 sustaining minor damage, 320 sustaining major damage, and 245 being destroyed. At least 22 levees were affected by the flood; total estimated repair cost is \$36,139,000. U.S. Army Corps of Engineers funding will address the bulk of this; CDBG funding from the regular state program and from the First Supplemental Disaster Appropriation have assisted several communities in providing match for Corps funding. A portion of these levees are being addressed with existing CDBG funds, but total assistance needed by local governments and levee districts greatly exceeds existing funding.

At least two communities in northeast Missouri have reported businesses affected to the extent that buyout and relocation of these businesses is desired. Widespread damage to public infrastructure has been reported by communities and regional planning commissions. The federal disaster declarations that are relevant to this supplemental appropriation are 1742, 1748, 1749, 1760, 1773, and 1809, and areas eligible for assistance are indicated on the FEMA website for the six declared disasters. All counties marked as designated during any 2008

disaster, as well as the cities within those designated counties, are eligible to apply for these supplemental funds. Areas not eligible for this funding include Benton, Caldwell, Clay, Clinton, DeKalb, Henry, Jackson and Lafayette counties.

Projects related to disaster relief, long-term recovery and restoration of infrastructure, housing and economic revitalization in areas affected by the declared disasters are prioritized as the areas of Greatest Need.

All applications will be evaluated on the criteria listed in the Application Evaluation section of the HUD-approved Action Plan. Proposed water or wastewater projects must still participate in the Missouri Water and Wastewater Review Committee process unless the proposed project is limited to direct disaster recovery. Project Dates and Duration of Assistance, Locations/Responsible Organizations

Projects being undertaken as part of this supplemental appropriation will follow the same guidelines for project period as the state's regular non-entitlement CDBG allocation. All Grantees are local governments that will have 24 months from the time of award to expend and close-out the project.

Amendment #2 to second Disaster Supplemental Action Plan

On December 31st, 2010 a tornado struck Lambert Airport in St. Louis and the surrounding neighborhoods and businesses in St. Louis City and County causing significant damage to homes and businesses in the area.

On May 22, 2011 an EF-5, multi-vortex tornado struck the heart of Joplin, Duquene and parts of Jasper and Newton Counties, leaving a six mile long and one mile wide path of destruction to homes, businesses, and infrastructure forever changing the fabric of this community and region. The tornado caused a tragic loss of life with current related deaths at 155, which is higher than any death toll from a tornado in 50 years. There are a large number of individuals still hospitalized from the tornado, many fighting to survive.

On May 25th, 2011 a tornado struck Pettis County causing damage to a mobile home park, businesses and school property.

Each of these tornados has caused damage to the housing and the economic infrastructure of the communities. Although the current impacts are not directly related to the damage suffered in 2008, each has unmet needs from 2008. Through this amendment, these communities may access CDBG, under the eligible categories and eligible activities listed in this Plan, to address these current and unmet needs.

Unmet Need from 2008

Already reeling from multiple weather related events in 2008, the region had suffered previous loss of homes and businesses through tornados and flooding from which they had not recovered. Multiple Presidential disaster declarations were made as a result of the repeated damaging weather in 2008. In addition, 2010-2011 Tornado events have exacerbated needs in some areas. The state is proposing to allocate \$27,000,000 to allow communities affected by tornadoes in 2010 and 2011 to access 2008 Disaster Supplemental funds to address housing and economic revitalization needs that were exacerbated by the 2010/2011 events, or otherwise meet unmet needs from 2008. While specific detailed grantee activities are still being determined, housing and business lending and demolition activities are expected to comprise all of the reserved amount. Initial estimate of business lending is being allocated at \$3,000,000. Ferguson 08-DI-74:Acquisition of properties is complete and approximately 68% of the funds have been used. The \$352,959.86 balance of the acquisition funds will be deobligated back to DED. 14 homes were acquired with the CDBG funds. Local matching funds were used to demolish those 14 structures. The City of Ferguson cannot acquire any additional properties due to budget deficits, and so we are closing the project. We are no longer seeking the seven (7) additional properties. Matching Funds for Acquisition of Properties is approximately 83% of the funds have been used. Staff is no longer trying to acquire seven (7) additional properties to be included in this project and will not need the remaining matching funds. Demolition is approximately 66% complete and approximately 63% of the funds have been used. To date, TA Contracting razed fourteen (14) homes, which include: 2 Burdale Ct, 3 Burdale Ct., 5 Burdale Ct., 10 Burdale Ct., 32 Suburban Ave., 44 Suburban Ave., 200 Suburban Ave., 204 Suburban Ave., 240 Suburban Ave., 318 Suburban Ave., 400 Suburban, 404 Suburban, 412 Suburban Ave. and 416 Suburban Ave.

The remaining demolition funds will not be used. Relocation for the acquired properties is 100% complete and approximately 21% of the funds have been used. Since staff will not be acquiring seven (7) additional

St. Louis 08-DI-78: As reported previously, it was anticipated that Ranken Community Development Corporation would serve as the subrecipent for this project. However, Ranken was unable to participate and CDA received approval from MODED for LCRA Holdings Corporation, LLC (an affiliated entity of St. Louis Development Corporation) to serve as the subrecipient. The contract and other contract documents were forwarded to SLDC for signature in the 1st quarter. Contract is expected to be executed early in the 2nd quarter. St. Louis Development Corporation (SLDC) issued a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) for Architecture and Engineering Services to provide design services and construction administration uring construction. The RFQ was issued February 17, 2017 with the deadline of Friday, March 10, 2017. The deadline was extended to Monday March 13, 2017. SLDC received 1 proposal from ABNA Engineering, an MBE firm. CDA requested MODED review the documentation of the procurement process since only 1 proposal was received. Upon review of the documentation provide, MODED approvedCDA to proceed with only 1 proposal. SLDC is currently working with ABNA to determine a reasonable price and scope of work given the project's budget. Once that is completed SLDC will submit a procurement toCDA for review and approval. Following approval of ABNA, SLDC and ABNA will work to develop bid documents and issue a Request for Proposals to select a general contractor to complete the construction. During the 1st quarter,CDA and SLDC also met with the Board of Public Service to determine if there were other options for construction instead of issuing an RFP for general contractor to complete the entire project. One option discussed was utilizing the City's "city-wide" contracts. The City has several existing "city-wide" contracts for work such as sidewalks, paving, etc. that are awarded following a competitive bid process overseen by the Board of Public Service. Another option was to utilize City departments to complete some work and then CDBG funds would reimburse the City for materials. CDA requested MODED provide feedback on whether either of these options would be allowable.

Demolition: All demolitions were complete by the end of the quarter. 100% Complete. Asbestos Inspection: There will be no need for asbestos inspections for the project. 100% Complete. Other Professional Services : There were no other professional services this quarter. 100% Complete. Rehab/Demolition Inspection: There were no demolition inspections this quarter. 100% Complete. Audit: The audit has not been required so far at this point in the project. 0% Complete. Administration: The HSTCC has provided all administrative services for the above work for the period. 90% Complete. St. Louis County 08-DI-85: Streetscape: 39% with \$829,853.07 spent to date. Raineri Construction is the general contractor and construction started in August. The Lemay Streetscape hardscape is now complete on the West side of Lemay Ferry Rd., excepting for the ADA ramps at Bayless Ave. The East side hardscape has worked South from Military Ave. and currently walks, drives, and parking lot are being poured at Bayless Ave. in front of the Turkish American Society. The rain gardens, ramps, and walks from Bayless to Horn are also complete with concrete and pavers. Benches, racks, and bus enclosure are now being installed in this area. Trees, plants, and sod plantings are beginning this week and will continue for the next 3 weeks for all raingardens and grass areas. Streetlights are installed and on in all areas excepting the last Zone from Horn to Hoffmeister. Engineering Design: 96% complete with \$326,218.23 spent to date. Design, engineering are complete. The construction documents are complete. The balance of these funds will be spent on construction administration. Engineering Inspection/Construction Inspection: 27% complete with \$39,418.20 spent to date. The MoDOT inspector, ABNA Engineering, is completing daily inspections on compaction, moisture and PSI testing of the concrete. All testing results have met the required thresholds. Other Professional Services: 99% with \$264,999.79 spent to date. The traffic study and civil survey of the project area have been completed. Carmody MacDonald was hired as the acquisition consultant and provided assistance with purchasing the necessary easements for the project. Administration: 20%. An administrative charge of \$14,634.28 has been made to the grant. Acquisition: 87% with \$44,916.15 spent to date. All final temporary and permanent easements necessary to proceed with construction of the streetscape improvements have been acquired. The cost for easement acquisition was less than anticipated, and a budget adjustment to reallocate funds was submitted and approved.

Greene County - SBDC 08-DI-87: Academic programs, advising, etc. for existing cohort:

Six HPA students were enrolled this semester in paid medical internships at Cox Health & Mercy hospitals in Springfield. Students are serving in medical internship programs in the hospitals in the following departments: Labor and Delivery, EMCT-Trauma, Nero-Ortho, ER, Pediatrics, and working in a Nurse Practioner's office. For the spring semester the HPA cohort were enrolled in 40 college classes, they will average 11.0 college credits per student this semester. The cohort is set to earn 110 college credits by the end of the 2017 spring semester. Students went on a tour of a community mental health center and met with administrative staff to discuss medical careers in the area of mental health. Students were able to see the clinical areas of a mental health center where mental health professionals treat individuals with mental health conditions.

Two pharmacists from a local hospital came to speak to HPA students about being a pharmacist as a career. The guest speakers informed students about what it is like to be a pharmacist, duties of a pharmacist, they discussed how to apply to pharmacy school, and why being a pharmacist is a good career.HPA students were able to visit a medical surgery center; they were able to tour various parts of the surgical center and operating room area. Students meet with surgical staff to discuss working in a surgical unit, how to get into medical school for surgery and nursing, how to overcome academic challenges, financial costs of medical school-ways to pay for school, ethical issues that come up when working with patients, duties of a surgeon & surgical nurse. Students were able to meet with a surgical nurse, general surgeon, and a plastic surgeon; they spoke about the fields of medicine, surgery, while answering student questions. HPA students met with the medical school administrative staff of Cox Family Medical Care Clinic (FMCC). Students were able to have lunch with a medical school administrator and a medical school-Family Practice resident. Student were able to discuss how to get into medical school, learn what Family Practice medicine is, ways to pay for college/medical school, duties of a medical resident, and effective ways to study for medical school exams. HPA counselor helped students with scholarship searches and applying for financial aid.HPA counselor assisted students with applying for post-secondary planning, helping them to apply to college. HPA counselor assisted HPA students with college placement testing and filing out college applications.

One student who was part of the fall cohort completed all her high school graduation requirements and did not return for the spring semester, she is set to graduate with the class of 2017. Recruitment/Evaluation/Selection of students for next program cohort:

HPA counselor presented to multiple science classrooms throughout the Springfield schools, presenting





about the HPA program to 9th, 10th, & 11thgrade students. HPA counselor presented about the HPA program to the Springfield Public Schools science curriculum meeting. The HPA counselor with a the Middle College science teacher met with all the departments heads of the Springfield Public Schools high school and middle school science departments. Teachers were encouraged to find students who met the criteria and refer students to the HPA program for the next school year. HPA Counselor has been interviewing students who are enrolling in next school year's cohort. The HPA counselor met with students at a local high school during lunchtime, using the lunch hour to promote the Middle College, and talk with students directly. HPA counselor attended a school assembly at a local Springfield High School, passing out information to students about the HPA program, Middle College administrator presented to students about the program.

HPA counselor led students from a local middle School on a tour of OTC campus. The Middle College & HPA programs were presented to students during the tour of OTC.

Administration: HPA counselor and Middle College Principal went to several Springfield high schools to speak topotential 10thand 11thgrade students to recruit for the program.

With the influence of a Middle College instructor, a member of the HPA cohort was selected for a state-level position for Phi Theta Kappa (the official honor society for community colleges). This student will represent the Missouri Region for the International Honors Institute, which will be held at Loyola University in Chicago. Middle College administration assisted with the Springfield Junior League, to host a luncheon event for the female Middle College students. The Springfield Junior League presented students with guest speakers who talked to the students about the importance of perseverance; each student was given a gift bag and access to free clothing items.

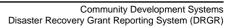

St. Joseph Metro Chamber 08-DI-91: The Buchanan County Degree Attainment Initiative funded six new recipients in Spring 2017, enabling them to continue university coursework leading to bachelor&squo;s degrees. Twenty-seven of the current 66 recipients have graduated. The newest sponsor/partner of the BCDAI is Herzog Contracting Company in St. Joseph, MO. Conversations are ongoing with additional





potential student participants and partnering businesses. The approved application for this grant noted, "the greatest perceived need was for current employees to complete a bachelor's degree and to receive on-site training and mentoring from the corporation" in order to be retained or promoted. Thus, we knew the project would extend over a number of years as participants pursued degrees, while working in positions from which they would be promoted. With 66 funded participants and of those 27 bachelor's-level graduates who have increased their value to their company and who have increased their contribution to the economic vitality of the region, the BCDAI has positively impacted the community. Recruiting efforts continue for applicants and business partners. The St. Joseph Chamber of Commerce and MWSU Western Institute continue in partnership to market the BCDAI. In order to increase the number of partnering companies and to increase the number of workers selected for funded training, recruitment activities continue among regional industries. As a result, several regional industries have expressed an interest in becoming a partner in the Buchanan County Degree Attainment Initiative (BCDAI). Unfortunately, many businesses do not currently have employees or interns who meet the "low or moderate income" criterion for this program. Thus, the work continues to locate qualified employees and interns whose program participation will help the BCDAI achieve the economic development outcomes outlined in the grant application. Joplin Chamber 08-DI-92: Joplin High SchoolInnovation Campus ProgramThird Quarter Narrative2016-2017 School YearMarch 30, 2017: Second quarter began with 52 juniors and seniors in the Innovation Campus program. One student recently moved with her family to the Indonesian Islands brings the total number of juniors and seniors currently participating in the program to 51.Students received progress reports the week of March 13th and all but two students carry a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or above. Arrangements have been made for the two students with academic deficiencies to receive tutoring.During the month of April seniors in the Innovation Campus program will complete a Grant Survey to provide the advisory committee with input into program strengths and/or possible areas for program improvement.Juniors will take the state mandated ACT exam on April 19th. Results of this exam will assist with plaement into appropriate classes for their senior year.Sophomores were recruited for the Innovation Campus program during the month of February. Thirty-three students currently meet eligibility requirements. Counselors from Missouri Southern State University will administer the Accuplacer exam on the Joplin High School campus to sophomore applicants for the program on April 21st. The Accuplacer exam determines college readiness in the areas of reading and writing and is one of four factors used in evaluating eligible for the Innovation Campus program.

Johnson County ED 08-DI-93: Job Training: The UCM Innovation Campus (MIC) continued to provide job training to a total of 83 students - no change from 4th Quarter 2016. At the end of the 1st quarter 2017, 54 of the 83 students have advanced in the program and are also gaining on-the job work experience at twenty one (21) business & education partners. Four (4) new business partners were added during the quarter for a total of 43 business & education partners. To estimate percent of activity completed, the amount of CDBG activity funds drawn to date (\$132,073.31) is divided by the total amount of the activity grant award (\$949,500). Based on this measure, 14% of the activity has been completed. Administration: During the 1st Quarter 2017, the administration completed the QPR Report for period ending 12/31/2016. To estimate percent of activity completed, the amount of CDBG administration activity funds drawn to date (\$6,604.06) is divided by the total amount of the administrative grant award (\$47,475). Based on this measure, 14% of the activity has been completed.

Cape Girardeau Development Foundation 08-DI-94: Number of Participants from Program A who were hired by a partner business: 11. During the quarter for which we are reporting, 14 students were trained and 11 secured employment. The Cape Girardeau Career & Technology Center (CTC) currently holds nineteen (19) business participation agreements. Advanced Manufacturing: No new Advanced Manufacturing BPA's were secured this quarter. Healthcare: Two new Healthcare BPA's were secured this quarter with Premier Physical Therapy and Gordonville Fire Protection District signing on to our list of





participating businesses. Southeast Missouri State University: The Fall 2016 semester began at Southeast Missouri State University began on August 22, 2016 and ended on December 16, 2016. The Innovative Campus Initiative assisted 8 eligible students with University tuition and fees during the Fall 2016 semester. The 8eligible students were enrolled in 105 credit hours and completed 93 credit hours. Originally there were 9 students for the fall semester, but one dropped before funds were requested. One student graduated at the end of the Fall 2016 semester with a Bachelor of Science degree in Agribusiness. The total number of Southeast Missouri State University Agribusiness graduates who have benefited from the Innovative Campus grant is 31. The total number of Southeast Missouri State University Agribusiness students majoring in Agribusiness who have received tuition assistance through the Innovative Campus Grant is 63 students. The original goal was 50 students. The students who are actively participating in theInnovative Campus Initiative were informed via e-mail that the Fall 2016 would be the final semester for the program.

St. Louis County Economic Development Partnership 08-DI-96: Twelve PHS graduates will become registered Pharmacy Technicians as they complete their internships at pharmacies in the area.

College Credit courses through STLCC – Fifteen Seniors received college credit in required mathematics courses prior to graduation. Administrative Activity: Students are now able to earn their Life Science Laboratory Certificate through an agreement with STLCC,

allowing High School students to attain certificate allowing them to work in all variety of Bio/Medical Laboratory environments. Students are going to Washington University and BRDG Park for their scientific research component. Starting with 2016-2017 school year, PHS will feature full 4-year STEM Pathways in Information Technology, Health Science, and Advanced Manufacturing. PHS now features the PLTW Computer Science Teacher of the Year for 2015 and the PTW Biomedical Teacher of the Year 2016. Further development of physical STEM lab, including a dedicated Computer Science/Information Technology lab

Continuance of STEM Advisory Committee comprised of Staff, Students, and Industry representatives. Building of a Sim Lab for Certified Nursing Associate program with 4 hospital beds, 4 practice manikins, and other CNA equipment at Pattonville High School. Continuance in our health/medical professions through our Pharmacy Tech program, our Certified Nursing Associate program, and our Project Lead The Way Biomedical Science program. Our PLTW program just got certified by PLTW, and will be a 4-year pathway at the beginning of the 2016-2017 school year, and students will be able to receive college credit for those courses through Missouri S&T. In fall 2016, we will offer college credit

through Lindenwood University for our Biology and Chemistry courses, as well as our Exercise Science course. We are also working with Fontbonne University to offer Bioinformatics dual credit opportunities. For Information Technology, we have adopted a Project Lead The Way based curriculum for Computer Science. Our student interest has grown exponentially in the program, our students have and our instructor was one of approximately 30 teachers nationwide to be trained for the pilot year of the latest Project Lead The Way course. We plan to offer Cyber security the following school year as well. We will be offering dual credit opportunities for Web Publishing and Computer Applications. We are also pursuing extensive partnerships with Fontbonne University in the areas of Computer Science, Cybersecurity, and Bioinformatics (which actually combines health/medical professions with information technology). Furthermore, we are pursuing the possibilities of having a CISCO academy in-house, or offering students the opportunity to get such CISCO certifications at St Louis Community College. In Advanced Manufacturing, we are actively working with St Louis Community College to find opportunities for our students, particularly through the Emerson Center for Engineering and Manufacturing. We currently offer college credit opportunities for students with Computer Aided Drafting, Computer Aide Drafting II, Digital Electronics, and plan to offer credit for Principles of Engineering this fall through Saint Louis Community College. STEM Career Fair for students; STEM Camp to try to bring more middle-schoolers into STEM interests in IT, Advanced Manufacturing, and health/medical professions.

St. Louis Small Business Empowerment Center 08-DI-98: During this guarter the Innovation Campus programs at Ferguson Florissant, North and South County Tech, and Jennings launched the second semester of the 2016-2017 academic year. At the end of the quarter we can report the following enrollment levels: North County Tech, 18 who meet program income guidelines. Jennings 8 enrollees, all of whom are income eligible. South County Tech 12 enrollees who are income eligible. Ferguson- Florissant 11 who are eligible for free or reduced lunches.(NOTE: We still have not been able to obtain parental permission to release name of Ferguson-Florissant students. Parents are reluctant to have their children's names released publicly. North County Tech: At North Tech, students continue to progress through each of their chosen technical programs. This included: Electrical Trades-Students in Electrical Trades have been completing PACT certification and are currently working with our partnerships with Ameren MO, Laclede Gas, and MSD. Students have been preparing by writing resumes, participating in mock interviews, and exploring internship possibilities. 11th grade students will begin making their selections from the Construction Innovations program and have the option to specialize in Electrical Trades next year. Welding- Students in the Welding class have begun completing their Welding coupons to be submitted for additional American Welding Society (AWS) certificates. All current Welding II students have at least one AWS certification and are working to complete additional certifications. The Welding I class has been making great progress in their first 3 months. Three Welding I students are competing at the State Skills USA competition this month. Precision Machining - Students in the Machining class are continuing to work towards National Institute of Metalworking Skills (NIMS) certification. The students also assisted the Robotics team in creating parts for the school robot and one senior participated in the First Robotics competition. This quarter the students have started working on a Battle-Bot. The class has also been working with EnTeam, an organization which provides in class professional development/training to try to promote the program to prospective students.

Jennings High School: The instructor, David Goetz was forced to resign due to health issues at the end of the quarter. He was replaced by Michael Daugherty, an experienced and certified instructor who previously filled during a previous illness. Of the 11 students who completed the first semester only eight (8) completed this quarter. Two students chose not to continue and one was removed for cause. During the quarter two (2) OSHA certifications were earned: OSHA-10 General Industry completed early February, and OSHA-10 Construction completed late March. All eight (8) students earned certification.

One Trade Many Careers textbook" and Project Book One. At the end of the quarter the students took the TSA Test but only 2 passed. (Carl Love and Donald Mack)

South County Tech: Electrical Trades - Electrical Trades students are working towards earning their Electrical HBI PACT Certification. This is a stackable credential that will be in addition to the HBI PACT Core Certification that was earned during the junior Construction Innovations program. Electronics and Robotics - Juniors are currently working towards their second ISCET (International Society of Certified Electrical Technicians) certification test and seniors are working towards their fourth ISCET certification test. Students are actively preparing for FIRST Robotics.

Precision Machining - The students in precision machining are preparing for their NIMS Certification Tests. Both juniors and seniors are working towards NIMS certification. In addition to NIMS, seniors are also working towards completing their senior projects.

Welding: Welding students from South Tech placed first and fifth out of 200 welding competitors at the April Tulsa Welding School High School Senior Welding Competition in Houston and finished first, second, third, and fifth at the February Tulsa Welding School's High School Senior Welding Competition in Tulsa out of 220 registered competitors.

Ferguson-Florissant: At Ferguson-Florissant the program has been merged with the School on-going Project Lead the Way (PLTW). This allowed the program to extend and expand its curriculum and grow its enrollment. While participation dropped from last semester, eligible students were enrolled in: Introduction to Engineering Design - This quarter the students spent most of their time learning about 3D modeling. They examined and calculated shape properties and density for geometric shapes. The students learned how to read and apply tolerances to their work, and how to identify tolerances when reading blueprints. The students worked through several practice 3D shapes that required them to recreate the shape using Autodesk Inventor software. The students have been working through the Miniature Train project for the past couple of weeks. During this project the students have had to create





10 train parts, learn how to assemble the train together, and place each of the parts in a drawing file with multiple views and dimensions. We are currently finishing up with the train assembly and we are working towards moving forward in the curriculum towards Documentation and Design Challenges. Principals of Engineering - So far this semester they have been studying statics and materials. The students practiced static problems, used MD Solids to analyze truss designs, and tested their own wooden bridges inside a stress analyzer machine. They have most recently studied various manufacturing processes and material properties. Digital Electronics - This quarter the students have been working on programmable logic devices, and shift registers, moving up to larger scale integration with more complex chips to handlecounting and display in a more efficient manner. Their goal is to work up to state machines by the end of the year. Civil Engineering & Architecture - This class has been working through the Keystone Library Renovation project. During this project the students are learning how to use a keystone building to be efficient and re purpose old sites and buildings. During this unit the students learn more about floor systems, roof systems, water supply, and storm water runoff, load bearing walls & calculations, foundations, wall systems, and so much more.

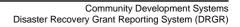
